

BAPTISM

"But what does it say? "The word is near you, in your mouth and in your heart" (that is, the word of faith that we proclaim); because, if you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For with the heart one believes and is justified, and with the mouth one confesses and is saved."

Romans 10:8-10 (ESV)

Confession of our faith in a public way is an expression of our heart choice to follow Jesus and accept Him as our Lord and Saviour. Through water baptism, believers in Christ publicly proclaim the testimony that they have been saved by the grace of God.

Being baptized with water does not save us; faith in the finished work of Christ saves us. Being baptized declares that we are saved

In Acts 2:38 Peter declared to those gathered on Pentecost,

"Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins..." (ESV)

Water baptism is an outward indication of an inward change. It is a demonstration in our lives that we embrace Christ's death and burial, the cleansing of our hearts and the washing away of our sin by the blood of Jesus. His resurrection brings us new life.

"Therefore, If anyone is in Christ. he is a new creation, the old has passed away; behold, the new has come."

- 2 Corinthians 5:17 (ESV)

Engage with the following study of the Scriptures regarding baptism and as you learn about baptism, consider your decision to be baptized...

Baptism is one of the two ordinances of the church. Ordinances are the outward rites which Christ has appointed to be administered in the church and in the life of the believer as visible signs and seals of the saving truth of the Gospel. The two ordinances are Baptism and the Lord's Supper (Communion).

What is Baptism?

By definition baptism is an initiatory rite of admission into the Christian Church and a symbol of our union with Christ, but it is far more than just a symbol as it signifies the burying of our earthly life and rising to new life in Christ. The following verses identify our action in baptism:

-- Romans 6:3-4 -- an act of identification with Christ -- Romans 6:13 -- an act of dedication to Christ -- an act of obedience to Christ -- an act of confession of our faith -- Romans 8:19 -- an act of declaration with Christ

In the Christian and Missionary Alliance and here at Westside Alliance Church we believe in baptism by immersion. The immersion, going under the water, is a symbol of death, and the raising from the water is a symbol of the new life that we have in Christ. This action ties us to the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, recognizing that our life comes through the life giving action of Christ.

The significance of baptism is twofold: first, it is a mark of being a disciple of Jesus and public confession of Christ as Saviour and Lord; second, it is the sign and seal of participation by faith in the death and resurrection of Christ.

We recognize that there are other methods of baptism practiced by other churches and other denominations as there tradition or circumstance has proved. The key factor that we take into account is that the baptism is believers' baptism. Many have been baptized as infants or children without having first made a personal choice in faith to follow Jesus Christ as their Saviour and Lord. The decision to be baptized again as a believer is a choice for each individual person to make before God. If you have further questions on this please speak with the Pastor or one of the Elders.

How should we Baptize?

John 3:23, Acts 8:36 -- Baptism required the use of much water

Matthew 3:16, Mark 1:10 -- Baptism required going down into the water and coming up out of the water

There are many verses that affirm immersion as the method of baptism: Acts 2:38-41, Acts 8:12, Romans 6:1-4, I Corinthians 10:1-2, Colossians 2:12

It is important to note here that baptism is not what saves us. There must be a profession of faith prior to being baptized. Baptism is a public confirmation of that confession of faith.

Why Baptize?
